FROM OUR CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

2022 was the year that we meaningfully began to return to an in-person, post-pandemic world, specifically in our Education and Community programs, while continuing our in-person medical and behavioral treatment. It has been amazing to experience the connection and joy in being face-to-face with our community members again. Our staff has done a tremendous job in continuing to foster welcoming, healthy and safe spaces for Philadelphians who need it most.

In October 2022, ICJ hosted the event Making a Difference in Our Neighborhood Community at the Church of the Advocate, where people who have experienced incarceration received access to important services such as a criminal record review, voter registration, opportunities for employment, and assistance with free cell phone enrollment services. As noted in last year's Annual Report, it was important for people returning from prison and jail to know that they had somewhere to go to for help. FIGHT received support to bolster medical-dental integration at the Pediatrics and Young Adult Medicine Center, allowing us to connect even more children and young adults to health and dental services. The World AIDS Day annual Prayer Breakfast was held in person for the first time since 2019, attracting over two hundred guests and reminding us of the strength of Philadelphia's faith communities. FIGHT hosted Adam Castillejo, "The London Patient," who is the second person known to be cured of HIV infection when his body became resistant to HIV infection after receiving a bone marrow transplant. Reminding us of why we have been committed to this work for so long, he spoke of spreading hope for a future HIV cure. In 2022, Google paid tribute online to FIGHT leader Kiyoshi Kuromiya. A personal assistant to the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., he was also one of the founders of Gay Liberation Front/Philadelphia and served as an openly gay delegate to the Black Panther Convention that endorsed the gay liberation struggle. He was involved with ACT-UP Philadelphia; PWA empowerment; We The People Living with HIV/AIDS; national and international research advocacy; and loving and compassionate mentorship and care for hundreds of people living with HIV.

Looking forward to the next year, we are working to make AIDS Education Month partially live, with plans for a live opening event on June 1st with guest speakers and panels at the Doubletree Hotel, along with an event at the Wistar Institute. Symbolically this is happening as we emerge from the COVID pandemic, and as you'll see both in this report as well as in upcoming

in-person events, we are centering our work around legacy and the roots of who FIGHT is as an organization. In joyous news, FIGHT's signature program Project TEACH has returned to in-person programming, attracting new participants and continuing to boast a strong alumni network. We see programs like TEACH as the heart and soul of the organization, and are proud to share their reflections and achievements in this report.

2022 was also the opportunity to honor long-standing members of FIGHT – patients and board members – while welcoming new leadership. We honor Bishop Ernest McNear and Scott Wilds, whose countless years of service as Board Members have helped FIGHT thrive as well as survive challenges such as the pandemic. We honor long-time patients who have trusted us with literally their lives; in return FIGHT has helped them manage good health and has been a source of support and love. And we now welcome new leadership such as Board Member Juli Miller, and our new Chief Clinical Officer Kari Hexem, who started at FIGHT during her time in dental school. Dr. Hexem has been FIGHT's leader and innovator in our dentistry work, and is now at the helm of our medical system. We are proud of our work, our patients, and our staff, and it is an honor to be of service to the Philadelphia community. We thank you in advance for whatever support you can provide FIGHT, since your generosity makes our programs and services possible.

▶ Bishop Ernest McNear

FIGHT honors Board President Bishop Ernest McNear, who has served on FIGHT's board for over twenty years and has been its Board President for five years. While leading the True Gospel Tabernacle Church, Bishop McNear has always prioritized HIV education, outreach and treatment in his work with Philadelphia's faith community and in leading missionary work in Ghana. Through FIGHT's Office of Faith Initiatives, Bishop McNear has hosted the annual Prayer Breakfast commemorating World AIDS Day, has led and curated educational conferences and curriculum development geared towards faith leaders, and has blessed the world with his musical talent in highly attended live performances featuring him and his choir. "What compelled me to join the board was the uniqueness of FIGHT's mission in working with the HIV/AIDS community. Scott Wilds

FIGHT honors long-time Board Member Scott Wilds, who has served on the Board for 27 years and recently transitioned to the role of President Emeritus. As Board Chair for a significant time in his service, Scott's involvement with FIGHT dates back to 1996, before life-saving HIV medications were available. "I remember going to FIGHT to meet Jane for lunch when FIGHT was two little rooms in a Graduate Hospital-owned building at 18th and Lombard. I first met Jon Lax through a friend of mine who was dying – I would take my friend to Jon's house to pick up the drug of the month. There was a pipe dream that there would be an unknown drug from Japan or something from the black market that would save someone's life. Jon ran that Buyers Club that did that, finding out about potential drugs, getting them and dispensing them. It was a very different time in the HIV world where just surviving was all you could hope for. FIGHT's focus at the time was bringing clinical trials and medicine to a community-focused environment. To do the testing to see if they worked and make them available to grassroots people was something that appealed to me." We thank you Scott for your service and dedication!

FIGHT STAFF PROMOTIONS



In 2022, **Akia Feggans** was promoted to Chief Integrated Behavioral Health Officer, FIGHT Community Health Centers; **Winner Bell** was promoted to Chief Education Officer; **Assata Thomas** was promoted to Chief Community Justice Officer; and **Catrina Peeples** was promoted to Chief HR Officer. By promoting these strong leaders, we also encourage a more inclusive definition of good health. According to the World Health Organization: "Health is a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being, and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity." We all believe this at FIGHT, and that is why we have developed our education programs, returning citizen programs, and integrated behavioral health programs to serve our clients as whole people – not focusing exclusively on disease. The superb care we provide to people in our health centers is also enhanced by the work done in programs that are outside our health centers, and to which our patients have easy access. We are all one organization and one community made stronger by all of our programs.

In 2022 **Angela Wells** was promoted to Chief Operating Officer, responsible for directing the operations, administrative and strategic activities of Philadelphia FIGHT as well as overseeing the department of Human Resources to build a highly inclusive culture - ensuring team members thrive and organizational outcomes are met.

Kari Hexem, DMD, MPH has been promoted to Chief Clinical Officer. In her new role, Dr. Hexem oversees the day-to-day clinical operations of all of FIGHT's medical clinics including Jonathan Lax Treatment Center, John Bell Health Center, FIGHT Pediatric and Adolescent Health Center, and Y-HEP Adolescent and Young Adult Health Center. Dr. Hexem has been a member of the Philadelphia FIGHT family since 2012. FIGHT HONORS :: THE WISTAR INSTITUTE


FIGHT honors its long-time partnership with the Wistar Institute, led by Luis Montaner, D.V.M., D. Phil. Dr. Montaner has been a part of the Wistar Institute since 1995, and joined FIGHT's Board of Directors two years later. As Wistar's Vice President of Scientific Operations, Dr. Montaner studies the mechanisms of disease in HIV-1 infection, cancer, COVID-19, and emerging viral infections such as monkeypox and the nipah virus, exploring new strategies to boost the immune system's ability to combat viral-associated disease or cancer progression.

Historically, FIGHT's research has centered around HIV and people living with HIV, covering three major areas – prevention, treatment and cure. Over the last few years, prevention has emerged to be a huge component of FIGHT and Wistar's research operations. This includes several PrEP studies, prevention efforts, and conducting treatment trials to identify the most optimal treatment strategies for FIGHT's patients. Finding a cure for HIV has been an important component of research; with FIGHT's 25+ years relationship with Wistar, the research team has identified areas to enhance that get rid of latent reservoirs and give the possibility of a cure.

In speaking with Dr. Montaner and what compelled Wistar to partner with FIGHT, it "was Philadelphia FIGHT's commitment to serve the community and the presence in the lives of people living with HIV and their current needs. The research program we wanted to develop was one that was responsive to the present needs of living with HIV. FIGHT was our gateway to gain an understanding of what those needs were." Dr. Montaner highlights FIGHT's strengths as a partner in this crucial work: "FIGHT provides the diversity of services addressing multiple communities and their health needs. FIGHT has the intent to service those that don't have resources that otherwise may not have access to medical care. With COVID as an example, FIGHT has the responsiveness structure to immediately address needs as they emerge."







SEAMAAC, a Philadelphia-based organization dedicated to supporting immigrant and refugee communities, honored Philadelphia FIGHT Community Health Centers as a Community Champion at their **Message to the Future** event on May 19, 2022. The award recognized Philadelphia FIGHT's outstanding work in providing COVID-19 testing and vaccinations to the South Philadelphia community during the pandemic.

SEAMAAC CEO Thoai Nguyen praised Philadelphia FIGHT's commitment, stating "We are humbled by your dedication to building a better future for our community members. Your partnership allowed us to strengthen our impact in the community, especially during the last two years of the pandemic."

The partnership between SEAMAAC and Philadelphia FIGHT has been instrumental in reaching immigrant and refugee communities in South Philadelphia, where language and cultural barriers made it challenging to access healthcare services. By working together, SEAMAAC and Philadelphia FIGHT provided vital information and services to these communities, helping to ensure that everyone has access to the resources they need to stay healthy and safe.





COVID RETROSPECTIVE

As we reflect on the trajectory of FIGHT's work since the start of the COVID pandemic until now, there is a sense of enormous pride at how deeply the FIGHT staff stepped up to continue and expand our services amid the most challenging global circumstances most of us have ever experienced. We reflect back on our goal to not abandon our patients in the crisis, and FIGHT leadership has enormous gratitude for all of the frontline staff who have kept FIGHT going, using both their professional skills and deep wells of compassion and commitment. FIGHT's departments changed their triage systems so that we could do our part to keep hospital crowding and congestion down, alongside the incredible work of the COVID testing team who, starting in 2020, reached countless Philadelphians in the most unpredictable times.












Our fearless COVID testing team hosted testing events in neighborhoods across the city, including Camp JTD, otherwise known as the Parkway Encampment. The priority was to focus on areas of the city that lacked testing options, and FIGHT built a network that alongside Center City included sites in North Philadelphia, Germantown, Kensington, and South Philadelphia. FIGHT fielded many phone requests for test results from this program, and spent much time guiding people to FIGHT testing sites, finding options for people who needed tests outside of FIGHT's availability, and getting test results back to individuals as soon as possible. November 2021 saw the Omicron surge, which illustrated the importance of continued COVID testing and support for those seeking COVID-related guidance. We did just as we have always done at FIGHT: we rose to the challenge of our times.

COVID RETROSPECTIVE



We all experienced relief at the increased availability of at-home, rapid tests that became available in 2022. This allowed people who were sick to avoid leaving their house and risking further COVID spread just to get a reliable result. FIGHT still provided guidance to those who tested positive at home, no matter where their test had come from. In the events when we gave a positive result to someone who lacked a doctor and insurance but was still in need of medical attention, we worked to refer them to appropriate acute care and connected them to our primary care services for further follow up. Even after home testing was widespread, we had a steady stream of people whose circumstances required them to obtain a negative PCR test, for work, travel or family visitation. We developed relationships at our testing sites with people who might never have come to see us in the gayborhood. but who now learned they could reach out to us for services above and beyond COVID testing. Those relationships will last even as the COVID pandemic shifts, and will continue to be developed in the uncertain terrain ahead.





COVID RETROSPECTIVE


We had braced ourselves for another surge this winter and were elated not to see a repeat of the Omicron pattern. The COVID testing program was funded through February 2023, although none of us knew what conditions we would face at that time. It is bittersweet to find ourselves in the position to sunset a program. The programs we build at FIGHT usually represent a community need with no end in sight. The last month of our program did see decreased traffic,

but we were still finding COVID-positive people, including several school-aged children. COVID is not anywhere near over, but thankfully the demand for this particular service has decreased.

FIGHT will continue its COVID information phone line/email system to answer general inquiries, will continue to help people retrieve past results from tests administered by FIGHT, will still make referrals to other testing sites, and field requests for FIGHT staff who need COVID tests as well.

The mpox outbreak discussed in this Annual Report was never inevitable: the COVID pandemic was never inevitable; the AIDS pandemic was never inevitable; and none of these diseases need to be allowed to continue. They all can be stopped in their tracks, with the application of community power and political accountability. But just as AIDS activist Bob Rafsky said about HIV in 1992, "this fight is not over until all of us are safe." Let us continue to think big and love large to protect our communities from these and all future diseases.

ADDRESSING mpox

In May 2022, the CDC identified the first cases of mpox (formerly monkeypox) in the United States, with cases ballooning over the summer. It became quickly apparent that people with recent anonymous sexual contacts, particularly men who have sex with men and transfolks, were at highest risk. Echoes of the early days of HIV were heard loudly and FIGHT Health Centers immediately began screening and testing for mpox, identifying several of the first cases in Philadelphia. FIGHT fielded over 200 calls with mpox questions, was one of the first sites in Philadelphia to provide mpox treatment and to receive and administer the Mpox vaccine. FIGHT administered 800 doses – the third largest number in Philadelphia after the Department and Public Health and The Mazzoni Center.



Additionally, hundreds of community members attended a virtual Community Conversation hosted by Philadelphia FIGHT and JD Evans Solutions to educate the public on mpox. This educational forum centered on mpox origins, mode of spread and prevention, and treatment.

When initial reporting stated that high risk Black Philadelphians were proportionally under-vaccinated, FIGHT immediately began direct outreach to our Black patients in high-risk groups. FIGHT partnered with the Mazzoni Center, Bebashi and Galaei in receiving grant funding from the City of Philadelphia for mpox vaccine outreach to this group beginning in 2022. FIGHT is a proud member of the mpox Community Planning Group hosted by the Philadelphia Department of Public Health, and is part of a joint effort to increase vaccination across the city through social media and dating app approaches. Fortunately, immediate response from FIGHT, the Philadelphia gay community, the City of Philadelphia's Department of Public Health, and other key partners allowed the city to quickly control this epidemic.

SPOTLIGHT ON PROJECT TEACH

Project TEACH (Treatment Education Activists Combating HIV) is an innovative health education program which trains people living with HIV/AIDS to act as peer educators, activists, and advocates in the underserved communities hardest hit by the AIDS pandemic. TEACH is a testament that HIV/AIDS is not a death sentence, and has demonstrated that peer-led education is powerful. TEACH's motto, teach one, teach ten, continues to be our North Star as we traverse the new and uncharted terrain of the closing gaps in the digital divide. COVID-19 pushed TEACH to contemporize for a world where healthcare is predominantly and increasingly reliant on technology; we refuse to sit idle while people living with HIV get left behind.







In 2022 TEACH experimented with both remote and hybrid classes. Bringing back in-person classes was a huge milestone that affirmed the most vulnerable and those in most need of TEACH programs, who are also the most affected by the digital divide. As time progresses, digital literacy will be essential for communities living with HIV to fully engage with and benefit from patient portals, telemedicine, and pharmacy services such as delivery, automatic payment, and refills. Digital literacy and access were huge barriers for many potential TEACH participants in 2022. Participants consistently voiced that if we had not offered them access to the internet and a device through the Critical Path Learning Center's Digital Lending Library, they would not have been able to participate in TEACH. We are very invested in returning to the classroom format for all TEACH classes in 2023, as well as integrating digital literacy and remote access options in every class.

SPOTLIGHT ON PROJECT TEACH

Youth TEACH will no longer be hosted in a classroom setting and is being redesigned as a learning retreat for young adults between the age 18-30. The program is looking to rebrand the name for Youth TEACH so it is more reflective and inclusive of this generation's young adults.



The TEACH Peer Education program will be enhancing digital trainings for

Peer Educators that work with the Jonathan Lax Center and the John Bell Health Center on assisting patients in navigating
the patient portal. This is to increase patient portal engagement between providers and patients at these health centers.

Finally, Project TEACH is growing! In 2022, the Project TEACH Expansion initiative launched in Scranton, Pennsylvania after a brief pause due to COVID-19. Over the next few years, we will bring TEACH to all seven regions of Pennsylvania, parts of the Northeastern United States, and beyond. Currently with programs also in Wilkes-Barre, our expansion will support the creation of a statewide network of TEACH alumni engaged in some form of peer education related to HIV treatment and/or prevention.

the numbers With the TEACH expansion network of peers and the tools of TEACH, we believe that bringing TEACH to new communities living with HIV will make a global impact on stigma, prevention, and treatment, and help promote the end AIDS in the lifetime of people living with HIV.

ADULT MEDICINE :: HIGHLIGHTS:

FIGHT received five Community Health Quality Recognition badges for notable quality improvement achievements in the areas of access, quality, health equity, health information technology, and COVID-19 public health emergency response. The badges include the Access Enhancer, Advancing Health Information Technology for Quality, Health Center Quality Leader-Bronze, Health Disparities Reducer, and COVID-19 Public Health Champion.



FIGHT was recognized by the American Heart Association and American Medical Association for its commitment to improving blood pressure (BP) control rates, earning Silver-level recognition as part of the Target: BP™ initiative.

n collaboration with Drexel University and the American Lung Association, FIGHT aunched a lung cancer screening initiative for adult patients. There has been significant improvement n depression screening, adult BMI screening and counseling, and tobacco assessment and counseling through Medical Assistant-led new workflows.

Ongoing projects include the Million Hearts through CDC Million Hearts initiative, a national initiative to prevent 1 million heart attacks and strokes within five years. FIGHT is also working on a new project called Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. This project aims to identify individuals who may be at risk for substance use disorders.



Kate Hennessy, Nurse Coordinator; Jake Cook, Lead Medical Assistant; and Michael Leonard, Certified Peer Counselor joined the John Bell Health Center (JBHC). Dr. John Heintz began seeing patients in September 2022, while Lizzy Schmidt started two sessions at JBHC to support walk-in patients and the Women's Health program. FIGHT saw growth in MAT and HCV programs, and an increased number of trans patients seen for hormone replacement therapy. It was a successful year for Adult Medicine, marked by growth, expansion, and a continued commitment to serving the needs of the community.

DENTAL :: HIGHLIGHTS:

In 2022 Philadelphia FIGHT Family Dentistry (Dental) entered its seventh year of operation, continuing to rise to the challenge of meeting the dental needs of patients and communities. An additional full-time dentist, Dr. Jooyeon Julia Park DMD MS, joined the Dental team.

FIGHT DENTAL WAS RECOGNIZED FOR ITS EXCELLENCE FROM MULTIPLE ORGANIZATIONS IN 2022:

- Recipient of the Domestic Access to Care grant from the American Academy of Endodontics (AAE) to support
 Dental's volunteer endodontist, Dr. Tina Chou DMD, and FIGHT's efforts to save teeth for the most underserved
 Philadelphians. This year, Dental completed over 100 endodontic procedures in part thanks to Dr. Chou and
 AAE support.
- FIGHT Dental was awarded a \$20,000 challenge grant from the Jerome B. Miller Foundation to support
 its medical/dental integration work with Pediatrics and the Young Adult Medicine Center, where
 the most vulnerable children are served.
- Dr. Tatyana Straus DMD, Dental Director, received the Fellowship Award from the Academy of General Dentistry.
- Dr. Kari Hexem DMD, Chief Dental Officer and Chief Clinical Officer, received the LGBTQIA+
 Advocacy Award from Penn Dental Medicine in recognition of her efforts to support diversity
 and inclusion.

Dr. Wilson Chan completed the ACTION Fellowship with Penn Medicine, and Dr. Daniel Mariche DMD was accepted and matriculated into the ACTION Fellowship with the 2022-2023 cohort.

FIGHT Dental strengthened its safety measures against COVID-19 and other airborne illnesses by upgrading air purification protocols, installing personal HEPA filters in every dental operatory as well as UV light filters throughout the clinical and reception areas, and resumed dental treatment in all 9 clinical operatories.

With Dr. Mariche-Poirot's leadership, FIGHT Dental also began offering Saturday appointments in coordination with FIGHT Pediatrics.

FIGHT Dental continues to partner with Jefferson, Penn, and Temple Universities, serving as part of the formal education programs for nearly 300 students.

Finally, FIGHT served more medically and socially vulnerable people than ever before: in 2022, 6,820 visits for 2,525 patients took place.





PEDIATRIC & ADOLESCENT MEDICINE :: HIGHLIGHTS:

In 2022, Pediatrics and YHEP were fully integrated to become the Pediatric and Adolescent Health Center. This process began during COVID when there was a need to cross-train staff in case of shortages, which enabled continuous services offered to our young patients during and post-pandemic.





Rebecca Keuch, MSN, CRNP and Lisa Knoflicek, MD, IBCLC were both promoted to become **Assistant Medical Directors** for the Pediatric and Adolescent Health Center.

FIGHT's work around pediatric medical/dental integration is thriving - 50% of our young patients 6 years old and younger are currently accessing both medical and dental services. In these instances, pre-visit huddles take place where the entire care team reviews the list of patients, identifies care gaps and connects patients to services; so it's possible to have a dental appointment and to receive a flu shot on the same day. This holistic approach successfully captures our most vulnerable patients.

Integral Molecular donated money and 60 hours of staff time to sprucing up the Health Center space with their staff of 15 PhD scientists - this year, they installed wall-mounted Montessori toys, increasing patient engagement in the waiting room and making wait times more activity-centered.

The Pediatric and Adolescent Health Center has doubled the number of young people seen for gender affirming care. The Health Center was also a recipient of a grant award from the Trans Youth Resiliency Fund; this allowed the Health Center to administer \$40,000 in cash to trans youth to use it towards what bring joy to their life. Among additional items, youth recipients of this grant used funds towards housing and

medication.

Philly Bookshelf has also continued its commitment to the Health Center through supporting the Reach Out and Read program, where every patient receives a book.

PREP :: HIGHLIGHTS:

In 2022, the PrEP team followed 469 patients (165 in Y-HEP and 304 in the John Bell Health Center).

FIGHT hosted PrEP week with more in-person events: two mixers which included on-site rapid HIV testing and same-day walk-in services; and the PrEP start "PrEP Rally" at both Y-HEP and the John Bell Health Center. Additionally, the team administered 4 educational webinars.



FIGHT continues to offer TelePrEP with virtual visits and at-home testing kits to patients, with 166 virtual visits for PrEP in 2022.

FIGHT hired two new PrEP Retention Coordinators at Y-HEP/Pediatrics (Erin Taylor) and the John Bell Health Center (Luis Noguera). They have helped to grow and expand the program through education and counseling patients about HIV prevention, retention of patients actively on PrEP, and re-engagement of patients that were lost to care.

In 2022, active Y-HEP PrEP patients grew from 92 patients to 165 patients. In the John Bell Health Center, active PrEP patients grew from 232 patients to 304 patients.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

One of PrEP's biggest achievements in 2022 has been the implementation of a long-acting injectable PrEP program. Being able to offer a long-acting option for HIV prevention has been monumental in changing the landscape for PrEP and reducing barriers. The PrEP team worked in collaboration with FIGHT's pharmacy and nursing teams to implement a workflow to get patients on injectable PrEP. From April 2022 (when FIGHT was first able to start prescribing the medication) through the end of 2022, the program started 103 PrEP patients on long-acting PrEP. This program continues to expand as more patients are interested in this convenient option.

Y-HEP continues to work in collaboration with Penn Medicine and the City of Philadelphia Department of Health on the PEP Center of Excellence Grant. This is a jurisdiction-wide, 24/7 PEP Hotline which provides initial triage and assessment of clients that have had a potential HIV exposure and provides same-day access to emergency prescription services for post-exposure prophylaxis and emergency contraception without in-person contact (i.e. they can avoid the emergency room). Young people that utilize this hotline and are under 18 years old are referred to see a provider at Y-HEP.

C A DIFFERENCE :: HIGHLIGHTS:

Patients at partnering agencies and in FIGHT's community-at-large are now eligible for direct referrals to HCV, HIV, PrEP, STI, primary health, dental, and gynecological services at Philadelphia FIGHT without a rapid HIV or HCV test or educational session, in order to expedite time to care and increase the likelihood of patients accessing whole-person care at FIGHT.

As hepatitis C is becoming increasingly eliminated in our community, we are aware that there will not be monumental growth in the numbers of new patients with chronic/active HCV infection seen at Philadelphia FIGHT. However, it's important to keep patients who have cleared or cured hepatitis C in the past engaged in primary and subspecialty health care, and to continue guiding those who are at risk of new HCV infection to comprehensive and holistic primary care, with an emphasis on harm reduction services. Many of those living with chronic HCV are more concerned with knowing their HCV status and learning about transmission prevention, rather than opting to engage in HCV curative care. We're developing innovative ways to change this trend and expand services at FIGHT to continue engaging our patients.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

C A Difference has been able to continue telemedicine services, mobile phlebotomy, and prescription delivery at our major partnering agency sites.

FIGHT has maintained and initiated close communication with several community service organizations through the pandemic and began a return to in-person outreach, education, and navigation services, as well as streetside outreach services.

The C a Difference team has sustained delivery of Hepatitis C and other chronic care medications to patient residences for those who couldn't make it to one of FIGHT's health centers or the pharmacy during and after the pandemic.

Outreach, education, and navigation services have grown beyond hepatitis C and HIV services, and FIGHT is focused on a whole-person comprehensive healthcare approach to every person in need of quality care in and around the Philadelphia area.





DIANA BALDWIN MENTAL HEALTH CLINIC





BEHAVIORAL HEALTH :: HIGHLIGHTS:

NEW BEGINNINGS is a licensed outpatient program for individuals struggling with Drug and Alcohol Use Disorder to establish and maintain recovery. Dedicated counselors and staff are committed to offering individualized and person-centered treatment. New Beginnings invested in a new campaign strategy that paid for advertisements on the SEPTA Market-Frankford and Broad Street subway lines to help spread awareness about services. New Beginnings started running Peer-led groups to help strengthen FIGHT's drug and alcohol community and allow patients to teach the knowledge they have gained through their recovery process. New Beginnings has also increased walk-in intake hours to allow for greater access to treatment.

DIANA BALDWIN MENTAL HEALTH CLINIC (DBC) provides culturally competent behavioral health services that address the psychological, social, and emotional needs of every patient. Licensed Clinical Social Workers specialize in providing trauma informed care to address various mental health disorders such as depression, Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), bipolar disorder and many others. DBC has seen tremendous growth in people seeking mental health treatment. Therapists are committed to holistic evidence-based practices to ensure clients are getting the latest in treatment techniques while validating the whole person. DBC has returned to full in-person services while offering telehealth as a secondary option for clients in need of accommodations.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CONSULTANTS (BHC'S) are located in FIGHT's health centers, providing an array of short-term behavioral interventions to help patients improve their physical and emotional health. BHC's are licensed clinical social workers dedicated to working with the patients and medical providers to achieve healthy outcomes. BHC's provides crisis interventions, short-term counseling sessions, resource referrals, and preventative care such as smoking cessation.

RESEARCH:: HIGHLIGHTS:

In 2022, FIGHT Research continued its work in the prevention, treatment, optimization, and understanding of HIV. This included FIGHT's participation in a nationwide observational study aimed at examining visceral fat distribution among people living with HIV who were taking protease inhibitor-based regimens, vs. non-nucleoside reverse transcriptase inhibitor-based regimens.

In addition, FIGHT Research began participating in an international, industry-funded phase II/III trial evaluating the safety and efficacy of two specific antiretroviral agents in combination for the first time among people living with HIV on stable, complex regimens.

FIGHT Research also continued its decades-long collaboration with the Wistar Institute by participating in a new, grant-funded observational trial collecting blood and urine samples from individuals who were fully vaccinated against COVID-19.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

In 2022, FIGHT Research enrolled more study participants and conducted more study visits than any previous year.



Karam Mounzer, MD and Emily Hiserodt, MPH co-authored 4 publications, and Dr. Mounzer co-authored an additional 7, all of which were directly related to FIGHT Research's collaborations.

Dr. Karam Mounzer, MD was named as a 2022 Top Doc in Philadelphia Magazine.

FIGHT's Education and Training Department has emerged from the COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns contemporized and fully invested in eliminating the digital divide in Philadelphia's most vulnerable communities. Through teamwork, sacrifice and a tenacity to support our students, the Education Department weathered the worst of COVID-19, while continuing to provide in-person programs, building curriculum on a learning management system for the first time, leading the wave of

virtual events and conferences though 2020's Virtual AEM programming, assisting FIGHT's Health Centers with patient portal support and navigation, and creating FIGHT's first Digital Lending Library and Digital Navigation training for participants without reliable access to the internet. We arrived at this place not by chance, but by choice: namely, by capitalizing on challenges and crafting solutions that built opportunity while simultaneously meeting existing needs and updating programing for the 2020s, all during a global crisis. We will apply lessons learned from the past two years and move forward with our community towards the end of the digital divide and health inequity.

CPLC:: HIGHLIGHTS:

The Critical Path Learning Center expanded hygiene kit service to all of FIGHT Programs and provided 683 kits, with a total of 13,144 hygiene items given out. The average kit had 19 items in the kit.

ACHIEVEMENTS:

After a 1.5 year pause due to COVID, laundry services returned to the Critical Path Learning Center with increased capacity and expanded referral sources for clothing needs.

A Program of Philadelphia FIGHT

The Community Health Training Alliance (CHTA) has been able to maintain online educational virtual offerings in the form of webinar series, social media engagement and CHTA Chats throughout the year in addition to a month-long virtual summit in June for AIDS Education Month. These webinars provide relevant public health information, adding value to the lives of our clients and the community.

Our successful CHTA CHAT series included a chat with the "London Patient" Adam Castillejo, the second person to be cured of the HIV virus. He shared his journey on enduring a decade of grueling treatments and moments of despair as he wrestled with whether and when to go public. Ultimately, he said, he realized that his story carried a powerful message of optimism. Other chats included Kia Harris-Carr from Beautiful Faces Foundation about the importance of health advocacy and building a community of supporters and Cameron McConkey, the Director of LGBTG+ Health Initiatives at Philadelphia FIGHT about gender affirming and inclusive healthcare.

In honor of Black History Month in February, 2022 we paid tribute to the work and legacy of bell hooks - Poet, Author, Educator, Social Activist & Feminist with a series of 4 webinars and presented 3 webinars on understanding grief and navigating emotions through self-care in December 2022.

A Program of Philadelphia FIGHT

2022 brought much activity and community engagement! In 2022, the Institute for Community Justice (ICJ) officially launched its quarterly newsletter to keep the ICJ community abreast of important information and updates. ICJ received funding support from Cresco Labs, the Jewish Healthcare Foundation, and was the recipient of the Neighborhood Promise Grant. This grant allowed ICJ to host two Resource Fair events in the summer and fall. In total, 234 people attended the fairs, with 57 participating in procedures to clear their records. ICJ also participated in the Deliverance Church Community Day Resource Fair, where a neighboring street was named in honor of its pastor. ICJ participated in its first bail-out fundraiser, The Bail Out Fund. This took place for the month of June (reentry month) to raise funds for the Philadelphia Community Bail Fund, and also included a highly-attended resource fair.



ICJ partnered with Assurance Wireless to distribute lifeline phones to participants, with quarterly donations made to ICJ based on participant phone requests.

ICJ continues its close partnership with State Correctional facilities to provide individuals with important resources available to them upon returning home. In May 2022, ICJ launched RWIN - a 14-week in-reach program with SCI-Chester, where ICJ staff facilitates classes with 18 men preparing for reentry. With an organic and holistic curriculum approach, RWIN also focuses on job readiness. Additionally, ICJ participated in Resource Fairs at two State Correctional Institutes.

In spring 2022, ICJ hosted a forum - The Misnomer of Black Girl Magic. This featured a panel of 5 African American Women who are part of the reentry community, discussing what Black Girl Magic means to them - including the stereotypes and injustices faced by Black women. This diverse, vibrant group of women brought an array of ideas and personal experiences around what defines Black Girl Magic.

ICJ also hosted a 3-part, all-day Restorative Justice training for its staff. Staff were trained on performing restorative circles to tackle issues faced in the ICJ community. With a focus on communication skills and conflict resolution, staff were equipped to continue their work with communities to provide an inclusive, solution-focused approach in problem solving.

To end the year, ICJ partnered with Mercy Worldwide to host a Holiday Toy Drive party. 59 families participated, which included 154 children between the ages of 2 and 8 years old.

FAITH INITIATIVES:


Two cohorts of Faithful TEACH were completed in 2022, with 23 new graduates to celebrate!

JONATHAN LAX TREATMENT CENTER

Our team offers compassionate, patient-centered medical care and social services for people living with HIV. Our dedicated providers work to address the unique needs of each individual. Inclusivity and respect for the dignity of our patients is at the center of all that we do.

JOHN BELL HEALTH CENTER

The John Bell Health Center is a comprehensive healthcare clinic that provides state-of-the-art primary medical care to adults age 18 and older. Our team of compassionate providers provides a safe space for people to access culturally competent medical care, regardless of the individual's insurance status, ability to pay, or life circumstances. We focus on addressing each patient's unique needs and challenges.

• FIGHT @ BROAD STREET MINISTRY

In partnership with Broad Street Ministry and their hospitality collaborative, FIGHT Community Health Centers Clinic at Broad Street Ministry is a satellite site of John Bell Health Center, offering primary care to the guests of Broad Street Ministry. The clinic offers primary medical care provided by Philadelphia FIGHT, and an onsite Care Coordinator provided by Health Partners. This groundbreaking partnership provided access to quality healthcare for individuals who are struggling with homelessness and chronic health conditions.

• Y-HEP HEALTH CENTER

The Y-HEP Health Center offers an inclusive, trauma-informed, gender affirming approach to healthcare for adolescents and young adults ages 13-24.

PHILADELPHIA FIGHT PEDIATRICS

Philadelphia FIGHT Pediatrics is dedicated to providing high quality, comprehensive, primary care to address the physical and emotional health needs of Philadelphia's children, from birth through age 18. We are specially tailored to care for children and adolescents who have experienced social adversity.

FIGHT FAMILY DENTISTRY

Our team specializes in a trauma-informed approach to dental care and the treatment of patients with dental anxiety, or a history of infrequent dental visits. We provide dental cleanings, periodontal treatments, fillings, complete and partial dentures, and extractions.

RESEARCH

Philadelphia FIGHT conducts advanced clinical research trials that test state-of-the-art HIV medications and novel treatment paradigms, as well as PrEP implementation and HIV cure-directed strategies.

C A DIFFERENCE

C a Difference provides navigation and linkage to care services for all Hepatitis C (HCV) patients at all FIGHT locations. We monitor all HCV testing at the John Bell Health Center and carefully track linkage and treatment data while supporting a comprehensive multi-disciplinary approach to medical care. HCV education, counseling services, and rapid testing have been made available at over 75 community-based locations, including recovery centers, senior centers, community centers and homeless shelters.

COMMUNITY PREVENTION, NAVIGATION & PREP SERVICES

The Community Prevention, Navigation & PrEP Services program at Philadelphia FIGHT aims to provide HIV prevention services and linkage to care throughout the city of Philadelphia.

MEDICAL CASE MANAGEMENT

Our Medical Case Management team is comprised of Masters-level social workers and licensed counselors, providing exceptional onsite case management services to people living with HIV/AIDS at Jonathan Lax Treatment Center and John Bell Health Center. Our team links patients to medical care and resources, provides adherence counseling and HIV/AIDS education, and assists clients with creating a realistic game plan based on personal growth towards a better quality of life.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

Philadelphia FIGHT's Behavioral Health Clinics are staffed by behavioral health professionals who are committed to providing an integrated, holistic approach to therapeutic intervention, and can help individuals develop the skills and attitudes needed to create a better today and tomorrow.

DIANA BALDWIN MENTAL HEALTH CLINIC

The Diana Baldwin Mental Health Clinic provides culturally competent behavioral health services that address the psychological, social and emotional needs of every patient. Our Licensed Clinical Social Workers specialize in Depression, Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), Bipolar Disorder, Anxiety, Anger Management and Family and Relationship problems.

NEW BEGINNINGS DRUG & ALCOHOL OUTPATIENT PROGRAM

New Beginnings is a licensed Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP). Our mission is to help individuals struggling with Drug and Alcohol Use Disorder to establish and maintain recovery. Our dedicated counselors and staff are committed to offering individualized and person-centered treatment. We believe that there are multiple pathways to recovery-based individual's unique strengths and personal experiences. We offer multiple, specialized groups and individual sessions to meet the needs of each person and our curriculum is based on the Department of Mental Health's (DMH) Recovery Transformation model. We help participants create their own wellness action recovery plans to develop self-awareness and a sense of hope along with personal responsibility and self-advocacy.

EDUCATION & TRAINING

The Department of Education and Training at Philadelphia FIGHT delivers and convenes a wide range of high quality, participant-driven educational programs, workshops, and events to Philadelphia FIGHT Community Health Center patients and participants, as well as to the wider community with a specialty in HIV and Sexual Health Education and Adult Education.

Our programs integrate holistic support for each participant and address the social inequalities most impacting individuals for the purpose of creating change.

COMMUNITY HEALTH TRAINING ALLIANCE (CHTA)

Our community and professional training program provides a year-long series of workshops, conferences, webinars, and symposiums on health topics that impact our most vulnerable communities. Programming includes our AIDS Education Month series of events and the HIV/AIDS Prevention and Education Summit. Through alliances with other organizations and groups, we convene speakers from diverse backgrounds, with a priority on elevating the expertise of those with lived experience from around the region on a wide range of topics that include: the opioid epidemic, Hepatitis C, trauma-informed care, sex work, housing and homelessness, mass incarceration, and more.

CRITICAL PATH LEARNING CENTER

The Critical Path Learning Center, an expansion of the Critical Path Project and the AIDS Library, is an educational commons and stigma-free space devoted to the intersection of health and literacy for the digital age. The Critical Path Learning Center is open to everyone. Health information, digital literacy classes, employment readiness trainings, GED and adult basic education, and hospitality and support services are some of many free services offered.

PROJECT TEACH

Our signature education program Project TEACH and our Peer Education and Sexual Health Education programs provide courses and workshops at FIGHT, in the community, and in schools. Project TEACH (Treatment Education Activists Combating HIV) is an innovative health education program which trains people living with HIV/AIDS to act as peer educators, activists and advocates in the underserved communities hardest hit by the AIDS pandemic – low-income communities and communities of color. INSTITUTE FOR COMMUNITY JUSTICE

The Institute for Community Justice (ICJ) is a comprehensive prison services and reentry program providing health linkages, supportive services, education, and advocacy for individuals, families and communities impacted by mass incarceration. Offerings include employment services, career wardrobe access, computer literacy, ABE/GED programs, case management, peer mentoring/support groups, anger management, family reunification, and expungement clinics. ICJ also provides referrals for housing, legal services, medical services, mental health, and substance abuse.

FAITH INITIATIVES

The Office of Faith Initiatives at Philadelphia FIGHT builds bridges between people living with HIV/AIDS and faith communities, and tends to the spiritual health of people living with HIV/AIDS by shedding light on hope, wellness and transformation. Faithful TEACH offers a 7-week education and training program for faith leaders whose faith communities are impacted by the HIV pandemic. Our Faith Leaders Network Meetings share information about HIV/AIDS and other public health issues.




